Last Tuesday Mr. Diaz picked up Victor and Rosa after school. They ran to the car. They could not wait to share their great news.




Mr. Diaz said, "I'm so proud of you, Victor. What is your prize?"

Jesus Christ is true God and true man.

The truth that God the Son, the second Person of the Blessed Trinity, became man is called the **Incarnation**. We learn about this mystery of our faith in the Bible.

In the Gospel of Luke, we read that one day the angel Gabriel gave a message to a young Jewish woman named Mary. Gabriel told Mary that God wanted her to be the mother of his Son. The angel also told Mary that she was to name the child Jesus, which means "God saves."

Do You Know?


A ngels are creatures created by God as pure spirits. They do not have physical bodies. Angels serve God as his messengers. They serve God in his saving plan for us and constantly give him praise.

Mary told the angel that she did not fully understand how this would happen. The angel answered, "The holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. Therefore the child to be born will be called holy, the Son of God" (Luke 1:35).

Mary agreed to be the Mother of God's Son. She gave birth to a son and called him Jesus. Jesus Christ is truly the Son of God and Mary's Son. Jesus Christ is both divine and human. **Divine** is a word we use to describe God.

Jesus Christ is divine; he is Lord. He did things only God can do. He is also human; he is like us in all things, except he is without sin.

What do we mean by the Incarnation?



Jesus shares the Good News of God's love.

When Jesus was about thirty years old, he began his work among the people. Jesus was to share the love of God with all people and to save all people from sin. So Jesus' mission was to spread the Good News of God's love.

And all of Jesus' words and actions—from his miracles and prayers to his Crucifixion and Resurrection—were carried out through the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Jesus' whole life was a continual teaching.

Through his words and actions Jesus taught people to know and love God. He

- fed the hungry
- cured the sick
- forgave sinners
- was a friend to those who were sick or in need
- showed people how to love God
- taught people to love others as God loves them.

Jesus told the people that God loves, forgives, and cares for all of us. No one is left out. He called people to follow him and share his mission. Many people accepted Jesus' invitation. Those who followed him were his disciples.

Jesus chose twelve of his disciples to lead the community of his followers. These twelve men whom Jesus chose to share in his mission in a special way are the **Apostles**.

Jesus teaches about the Kingdom of God.

Crowds of people followed Jesus everywhere he went. They wanted to hear him teach. Jesus often spoke about the Kingdom of God. He told them, "The kingdom of God is at hand" (Mark 1:15).


The Kingdom of God is not a place you can find on a map. The **Kingdom of God** is the power of God's love active in our lives and in our world. The Kingdom of God was made present through Jesus' words and actions.

Jesus taught us about God's Kingdom in special stories called parables. In one parable Jesus said that the Kingdom of God was like a great treasure that people would want above all things. (See Matthew 13:44.) In another parable Jesus said that the Kingdom of God was like a mustard seed, a tiny seed that grows into a very large plant. (See Matthew 13:31–32.)

Jesus taught that the way to live for God's Kingdom is by turning away from sin and doing what God asks us to do. All people are invited to become a part of the Kingdom and to spread God's love in the world. All people are invited to become faithful followers of Jesus.

The Kingdom of God will not be complete until Jesus returns in glory at the end of time. So each day we work and live for God's Kingdom as we look forward to being with God forever in Heaven.
