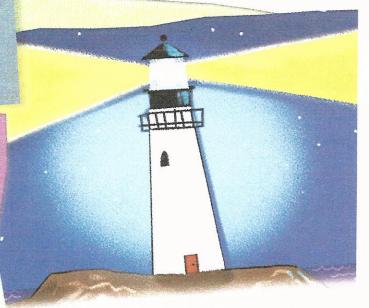

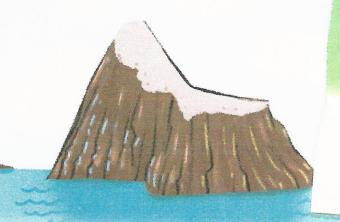

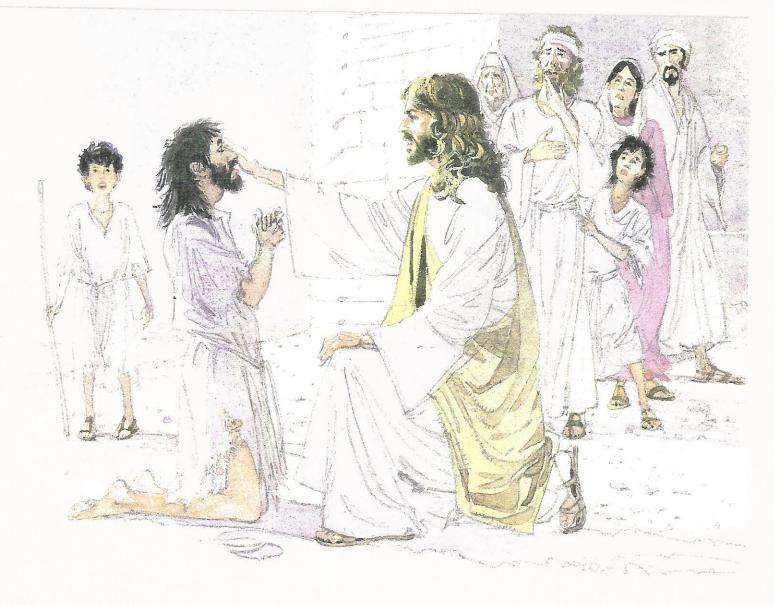

Jesus is the greatest sign of God's love.

Jesus Christ is the Son of God. Everything that Jesus said or did pointed to God's love for us. So all of Jesus' words and actions are signs of God's love. In the Gospels we read about these words and actions. We read about:

- ways that Jesus opened his arms and welcomed all
- ways that Jesus spent time with people whom others disliked or neglected
- ways that Jesus fed those who were hungry
- ways that Jesus touched people and healed them both physically and spiritually

- ways that Jesus comforted sinners and forgave their sins
- the way that Jesus gave his life to save us all from sin.

For all of these reasons Jesus is the greatest sign of his Father's love.

Jesus knew that his disciples needed him to be present with them. Yet he would have to leave them and return to his Father in Heaven. So Jesus promised them that he would always be with them through the power of the Holy Spirit.

In what ways did Jesus show people God's love for them?

The Church celebrates seven special signs, the sacraments.

Over time, the Catholic Church recognized certain symbolic actions as signs of the risen Christ made present in the community through the power of the Holy Spirit. Eventually the Church named seven of these actions or signs it had received from Jesus Christ as the Seven Sacraments. These Seven Sacraments are Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist, Penance and Reconciliation, Anointing of the Sick, Holy Orders, and Matrimony.

All Seven Sacraments are signs of God's presence in our lives. But sacraments are different from all other signs. They are

effective signs which means that they truly bring about what they represent. For example, in Baptism we not only celebrate being children of God, we actually become children of God. In Penance and Reconciliation we not only celebrate that God forgives, we actually receive God's forgiveness.

This is why we say that a **sacrament** is an effective sign given to us by Jesus Christ through which we share in God's life. This gift of God's life in us is **grace**. Through the Holy Spirit we receive grace in each sacrament. This grace, called *sanctifying grace*, heals us of sin and helps us to grow in holiness. As God's goodness and holiness grows within us, we become more like Jesus. Grace strengthens us to live as Jesus called us to live.

How does the grace we receive in the sacraments help us?

od freely offers his grace to us in the sacraments. Through the grace we receive in the sacraments, we respond to the presence of God in our lives. We show that we are open to this grace by fully participating in the celebration of each sacrament and by making a commitment to live as disciples of Jesus.

During the celebration of the sacraments, Christ is joined in a special way with the Church. The Church, the whole Body of Christ, celebrates each sacrament. The priest and other members of the Church who participate in the sacraments represent the whole Church. The sacraments unite

Catholics all over the world with

Jesus and with one another.

There are three groups of sacraments: Sacraments of Christian Initiation, Sacraments of Healing, and Sacraments at the Service of Communion.

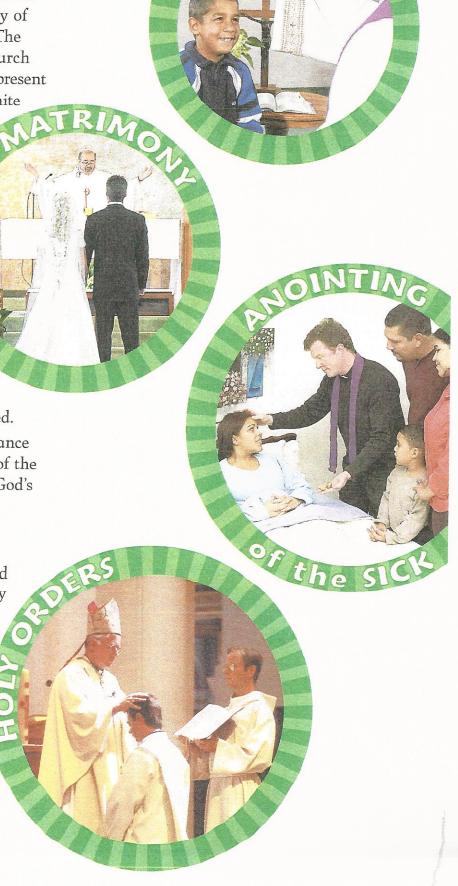
• The Sacraments of Christian Initiation are Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist. Through these sacraments we are born into the Church, strengthened, and nourished.

• The Sacraments of Healing are Penance and Reconciliation, and Anointing of the Sick. Through them we experience God's forgiveness, peace, and healing.

• The Sacraments at the Service of Communion are Holy Orders and Matrimony. In Holy Orders a baptized man is consecrated and in Matrimony a man and woman are blessed to serve God and the Church through a particular vocation.

It is through the grace that we receive in the sacraments that we are able to respond to the presence of God in our lives.

MORE for You to Know



DEPOSIT OF FAITH The Deposit of Faith is all the truth contained in Scripture and Tradition. Jesus Christ revealed and entrusted this truth to the Apostles. They, in turn, entrusted this truth to their successors, the bishops, and the entire Church.

It is within the Church, the community of faith, that we discover the truth. The Magisterium, the living teaching office of the Church, guides us in understanding the truth. The Magisterium consists of the pope and bishops. They teach us the correct understanding of the message of Scripture and Tradition and ways to live out this message.

In each generation, the whole Church continues to share and build upon the faith of the Apostles. With the guidance of the Holy Spirit, the Church hands on all the truths she has received through God's Revelation. The Church's faith is always developing, and God's Revelation is living and active in the Church.

INFALLIBILITY Infallibility is the gift of the Holy Spirit that keeps the Church free from error—in her beliefs and teachings—in matters concerning Divine Revelation and the Deposit of Faith. The pope also has the gift of infallibility when he defines a truth pertaining to faith and morals.

THE LORD'S PRAYER During the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus taught his followers the Lord's Prayer, a prayer to God the Father. This prayer is an essential prayer of the Church—integrated into her liturgical prayer and sacraments.

In the first part of the Lord's Prayer, we give glory to God, we pray for the coming of God's Kingdom, and we pray to God for the ability to do his will.

In the second part of the Lord's Prayer, we ask God for everything we need for ourselves and for the world. We ask God to heal us of our sin. We pray that God will protect us from all that could draw us away from his love. We ask God to guide us in choosing good in our lives, and we ask him for the strength to follow his law.
