
## The Church Offers Us New Life in Christ

### Baptism is the foundation of the Christian life.

Baptism is the first sacrament that we celebrate. In fact, we are unable to receive any other sacrament until we have first been baptized. Through Baptism we receive a share in God's own life, the life of grace. The grace of Baptism makes us children of God, members of Christ, and Temples of the Holy Spirit. It gives us the power to live and act as disciples of Jesus Christ.

Baptism leads us to the other two Sacraments of Christian Initiation, Confirmation and Eucharist. **Baptism** is the sacrament in which we:

- Are freed from sin: Jesus' victory over sin and death offers us Salvation. Salvation is the forgiveness of sins and the restoring of friendship with God. Baptism is necessary for Salvation. Baptism frees us from Original Sin and all our personal sins are forgiven.
- Become children of God: We become sisters and brothers with everyone else who has been baptized. Baptism makes us members of one family. God sees all of us as his children. He loves each one of us.
- Are welcomed into the Church: At
  Baptism we are welcomed into a
  community of believers led by the
  Holy Spirit. We become a part of the
  Body of Christ, the People of God.
  We are united with all those who
  have been baptized in Christ.

#### Do You Know?

t Baptism we are sealed, or marked forever, as belonging to Jesus Christ. This spiritual mark, called a character, can never be erased. Once we have received Baptism, no matter what may happen, we belong to Christ and the Church. Thus, Baptism is a sacrament that is never repeated. Once we have been baptized, we are marked forever with the sign of faith and have the hope of eternal life, living in happiness with God forever.





### We celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism.

Many people are baptized as infants or young children. Others are baptized as older children, adolescents, or adults. No one is ever too young or too old to begin a new life in Christ through Baptism.

In many parishes infants or young children receive the Sacrament of Baptism on Sunday, the day of Jesus Christ's Resurrection. The celebration of the sacrament on Sunday highlights the fact that through Baptism we rise to new life in Christ. The Sunday celebration allows parish members to participate in the celebration. The **celebrant** of Baptism is a bishop, priest, or deacon. He celebrates the sacrament for and with the community. Because Baptism is necessary for Salvation, when there is a serious need, anyone can baptize.

The actual Baptism can take place in two ways. The celebrant can immerse, or plunge, the child in water three times. Or the celebrant can pour water over the child's head three times.

While immersing or pouring, the celebrant says,

"N.[name], I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

Chrism is perfumed oil blessed by the bishop. The celebrant anoints the newly-baptized child on the crown of the head with Chrism. This anointing is a sign of the Gift of the Holy Spirit. It shows that the newly-baptized child shares in the mission of Jesus Christ. This anointing also connects Baptism to the Sacrament of Confirmation during which another anointing with Chrism takes place.

#### We celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Confirmation is the sacrament in which we receive the Gift of the Holy Spirit in a special way. Confirmation is a Sacrament of Christian Initiation. Confirmation strengthens our bond with Christ and the Church. All baptized members of the Church are called to receive this sacrament. A bishop from the diocese comes to the parish to confirm the candidates, often during a special Mass. When necessary, a bishop may designate a priest to confirm the candidates.

The bishop confirms each candidate by laying his right hand on the candidate's head and tracing the Sign of the Cross on the candidate's forehead with Chrism.

> As the bishop does this he calls the candidate by name, saying, "Be sealed with the Gift of the Holy Spirit."

The person confirmed responds, "Amen."

At Confirmation, the anointing with Chrism confirms and completes the baptismal anointing. Like the character or mark of Baptism, the seal of Confirmation is with a person always. Because of this, a person receives Confirmation only once.



Those who are baptized as adults or older children often receive Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist at one celebration, usually at the Easter Vigil. Those who are baptized as infants or young children usually receive Confirmation between the ages of seven and sixteen.

The parish community helps young people prepare for Confirmation through prayer, instruction in the faith, and opportunities for service. The people who are to be confirmed are called candidates. Candidates must profess their faith, be without serious sin, desire Confirmation, and be ready to live their faith.

When we are baptized, the Holy Spirit shares seven spiritual gifts with us to help us to live as faithful followers of Jesus Christ. At Confirmation the Holy Spirit strengthens these gifts within us so that throughout our lives we can be witnesses to our faith in our words and actions. The Gifts of the Holy Spirit are: wisdom, understanding, counsel (right judgment), fortitude (courage), knowledge, piety (reverence), and fear of the Lord (wonder and awe).
